










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SCHOOL VOUCHERS


INTRODUCTION


- 1. The Education Trust Fund effectuates the New Hampshire Legislature's constitutional duty to maintain and support a public school system. RSA 198:39; Claremont School Dist. v. Governor, 138 N.H. 183, 184 (1993). Use of the Education Trust Fund is limited by statute, the primary purpose of which is the distribution of funding to municipal school districts and approved charter schools in discharge of the State's constitutional duty to provide a public education. See RSA 198:39 (Education Trust Fund statute).
- In 2021, the New Hampshire legislature enacted a private education voucher program in the form of "education freedom accounts." See RSA 194-F et seq. (hereinafter the "EFA" or "voucher" program).

SCHOOL VOUCHER EXPANSION

- Is a child with a disability
- Multilingual student
- In foster care
- Status as a "migratory child"
- Experiencing homelessness
- Eligible for school meals (<185% of FPG)
- Parent who is a member of the armed forces
- Lives within "geographic boundary" of a CSI School
- Has a documented manifest educational hardship
- "Persistently bullied" student



SCHOOL VOUCHER EXPANSION

House Bill 367

- Income eligibility: <500% Federal Povery Guideline (\$150,000 for a family of four in 2023 -- current limit: <300%, or \$90,000 for a family of four)
- Would nearly double eligibility

- Removes income eligibility
- Resident of the state who is eligible to enroll in a public elementary or secondary school



LOCAL SCHOOL VOUCHERS

- Establishes a locally-funded school voucher program
- Eligible students would be attending their local public school, charter school, are a kindergarten student, or are homeschooled
- Requires 3/5 majority vote on school warrant article
- Voucher would be twice the per-pupil adequate education grant per student (including differentiated aid)
- School district would receive state adequate education dollars for that student



SCHOOL VOUCHER BILLS

House Bill 430

Repeals the school voucher program

House Bill 573

• Limits funding to budgeted amounts

House Bill 626

Requires NHED to administer voucher program

- Allows voucher funds to be used to pay for courses at public schools
- Adds "intentional" to misuse statute
- Adds organizational requirement to report misuse to Attorney General
- Adds reporting requirements

Repeals divisive concepts law

Allows NHED to sue school districts on behalf of a person

Replacing program elements with boilerplate language

Removal of local competencies and removal of certified educators in granting credit

Changes throughout that minimize formal instruction
